Our day started off very well at 8:20 sharp. Dressed in our snazzy

We then ran off to attend the Primary muster, where we let them know our plans for the day. English/HSIE Faculty

Teaching the class has also contributed to a development of confidence and ability to explain key ideas.



History Buffs

The Year 12 Ancient History are enjoying a viewing of Caligula, the documentary, in the course of their study of the Julio Claudians of Ancient Rome.



The students of Modern History in Year 11 are undertaking a student-directed historical investigation, which is building their independent research skills.

Geographically speaking ...

Stage Five HSIE classes are studying Australia's Changing Communities with a focus on sustainability, multiculturalism and globalism. Strong classroom discussions are contributing to the students' ability to construct meaningful extended responses. Students are also developing their geography skills in the context of a community study comparing the demographics of Lightning Ridge and Walgett.



In the Stage Four HSIE classes, the focus has been on the different Global Environments around the world. Students have been compared the challenges of living in these different parts of the world, such as the polar, **desert and tundra. The students' favourite** environment to investigate is the Rainforest Environment and they practising their map **reading skills to locate the world's great** rainforests.



We all Stand on Sacred Ground:

Learn, Respect & Celebrate

22 June to 26 June 2015

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' unique and timeless connection to land is the special focus and theme of this year's National NAIDOC Week celebrations.

The theme – *We all Stand on Sacred Ground: Learn, Respect and Celebrate* – highlights Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' strong spiritual and cultural connection to land and sea.

The National NAIDOC Committee encourages all Australians, young and old, to embrace the 2015 National NAIDOC theme and to respect and celebrate local and national sites of **significance or 'sacred places' and to learn of their traditional names, history and stories.** For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, a sacred place could be a geographic feature like a river or lake, a beach, bays, inlets, hills or mountain ranges. They could also be ceremonial grounds, galleries of rock art or engravings, or places used for gathering for cultural practices.

As the oldest continuing culture on the planet, the living culture of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples is intrinsically linked with these sacred places. Long before European arrival, these places had traditional names that reflect the timeless relationship between the people and the land. Often they are connected with Dreaming stories or tell of the meaning of an area. National NAIDOC Committee co-**chairs Anne Martin and Benjamin Mitchell said this year's** theme is an opportunity to pay our respects to country, acknowledge those who work tirelessly on preserving land, sea and culture and to celebrate our many sacred and significant places. Benjamin said that these places have been of important significance for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people for tens of thousands of years.

"Lots of places in your local region, your town or your city have traditional names and dreaming stories and we encourage everyone to learn more about their history, their meaning and the extraordinary relationship they have to the traditional custodians."

Anne points out that this year's theme was specifically chosen to also highlight and celebrate a significant anniversary of one of Australia's most iconic sacred places – Uluru.

"2015 marks the 30th anniversary of the 'Handback' of Uluru to its traditional owners on 26 October 1985 and we wanted to honour and share their story with the nation."

Behaviour Code for Students

This document from the Department of Education and Training was released recently to outline the expectations for Students and schools in regard to behaviour at school. Lightning Ridge Central School has done a lot of work with all involved with our school over recent years to successfully address student behaviour.

This document reinforces what we are trying to achieve and we will continue to work for – now with greater support from DEC.

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected to:

- Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- Strive for the highest standards in learning
- Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members
- Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Respect all property
- Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools
- Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

Behaviour Code for Students: Actions

Promoting the learning, wellbeing and safety of all students in NSW Public Schools is a high priority for the Department of Education and Communities.

We implement teaching and learning approaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

Respect

- Treat one another with dignity
- Speak and behave courteously
- Cooperate with others
- Develop positive and respectful relationships and think about the effect on relationships before acting
- Value the interests, ability and culture of others
- Dress appropriately by complying with the school uniform or dress code
- Take care with property

Safety

Model and follow departmental, school and/or class codes of behaviour and conduct

- Negotiate and resolve conflict with empathy
- Take personal responsibility for behaviour and actions
- Care for self and others

Avoid dangerous behaviour and encourage others to avoid dangerous behaviour

Engagement

- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Arrive at school and class on time
- Be prepared for every lesson
- Actively participate in learning

Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments. The department provides a policy framework and resources such as Legal Issues Bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context the NSW Government and the Department of Education and Communities will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.
