At the start of the last holidays I was fortunate enough to be able to attend the Moorambilla choir concert in Dubbo. In the past I have supported Moorambilla because of the effect I have seen on students attending, the growth in confidence, the change in a view to being more positive and the experience of learning and working in a very different environment. Having seen the concert, I am now even more impressed by the work the Moorambilla team do in pulling together a world-class concert involving not only students from the West including many from our own school but also talented artists from around Australia and in fact around the world who come to support this amazing cultural event. Well done to the team who organise this event and well done to the Lightning Ridge team who support our students to get there, because without the fund raising that goes on all year the attendance of many of our students would not be possible.

In the last week I've had two visitors to the school. One parent of a student who intends to enrol here next year from the northern beaches of Sydney and the other the Vice Chancellor of the University of New South Wales. Both were incredibly impressed with our school.

The 1st thing that impress them was the quality of our facilities, the beautiful buildings, the green grass, the open spaces and the level of technology in classrooms. These things are the 1st things that all visitors to our school see because our school is always clean, because our school is so well maintained and because we have students who look after our facilities, we have higher quality facilities than most schools in New South Wales. The 2nd thing to grab their attention was the fact that during lesson times our school is quiet. All students are in class and learning and the learning activities going on in classrooms are vibrant, engaging and world-class.

Both of my visitors looked at our school from a different point of view one as a potential parent who wants to give his child the best opportunities for learning and wanted to ensure that Lightning Ridge was able to offer those opportunities. Were able to reassure him and allow him to see the quality of education provided to Lightning Ridge students and he was very impressed.

The other looked at our school through the eyes of an experienced educator. Someone who spent their life working in education and he was exceptionally impressed after speaking to a group of students who have been involved in the University of New South Wales Aspire Program.

This amazing program, led in our school by Jesse Druzinec, gives students from kindergarten through to Year 12 the opportunity to find out more about University life. Our students were able to explain to the Vice Chancellor what their aspirations for the future were and many new the pathway to reach that aspiration. It was amazing to see students from year 9 through to year 11 speaking with the Vice Chancellor of the University without concern for his position but simply as one person to another. The Vice Chancellor commented that this does not happen in most schools and in most schools he visited students, particularly year 9 and 10, often had no idea of where they wanted to head after leaving school and very rarely did they know the pathway to follow if they did have a career aspiration.

Seeing the reaction of these people and the interaction between our students and the Vice Chancellor I was reminded yet again that how capable and competent our students are, how confident they are because of the opportunities they get at school, at home and in the community. Students sometimes comment that because they are from Lightning Ridge they have limited options for the future, I disagree; I truly believe that Ridge kids as good as anyone and can work to become whatever they want in their adult lives.

On the 19th we have our CAPA night and I'm sure it will be an amazing success and I look forward to it every parent coming along to see their child perform and enjoy this opportunity to showcase the talents of our kids and enjoy some family time. There will be a barbecue available before the show to help those parents rushing home from work who may not have the time to prepare the usual evening meal.

On the 20th we have a group travelling up from Dubbo to involve our primary students in a dream Cricket program. Dream cricket promotes basic cricketing skills and enjoyment of activity at a level that everyone can participate and be successful with and enjoy. Students will be treated to a sausage sizzle for lunch, this is another activity being supported by Lightning Ridge Rotary

On the 21st my boss will be coming to the school to check that all is going well and meet with some staff and students.

The following Friday the 28th is Grandparent's day and I will be huge celebration of the importance of grandparents to our school and community hard like to see as many grandparents and grandfriends as possible to come in and spend some time with their grandchildren. A barbecue lunch will be provided by the School the P&C and Lightning Ridge Rotary.

Popular recipes include tea-tree oil, eucalyptus oil, vinegar, olive oil, orange oil and lavender mixed with a thick conditioner.



Making it hard

While your child has nits (the eggs) spraying the hair with hairspray or combing hair gel through the hair makes it hard for the nits to attach to the hair shafts.



Conditioner treatment

Apply a thick white conditioner and using a nit comb, section the hair and carefully comb, this is essential in getting rid of the nits and the lice. Remember to wipe the comb after each swipe. Keep combing until you can't see any more eggs. Do this again in 7 days.

What an amazingly busy and wonderful learning time we had in Term 3! Term 4 is looking to be the same. Students in all classes were excitedly rehearsing for a wonderful CAPA night this term. Students have also been getting excited about our excursion to Lake Burrendong in week 4 as well as producing some wonderful writing and self-portraits for Grandparents day next week. In amongst all these great events students have been participating in wonderful learning experiences in their classrooms.

S2F have been having a wonderful time in writing. Students are planning, writing, editing and publishing lots of quality work. They have also written and produced some lovely presentations in preparation for Grandparents Day. Maths groups have proven to have had some wonderful results, and Ms Slater was over the moon with many of the student's work samples.

S2H have also been charging along with a major focus this term on writing, particularly information reports. Students have been researching a chosen animal and are not only writing about the animal, but will also complete a visual project and class speech on the subject.

S2O cannot be forgotten as they too have worked hard on their CAPA performance based on the movie Aladdin. Numeracy has also been a success for the class with students progressing along very well. Students have also been given a focus on writing this term, utilising the skills they have been taught in spelling, comprehension, punctuation and reading groups.

Students in S2H had a construction day late last term. The students were challenged to build the tallest structure from rolled of newspaper sheets and masking tape. Groups came up with different designs and construction ideas. Initiative and problem solving was magnificent to observe through the activity.



This term, our last of the year, will be a busy one: we are looking forward to a variety of events:

Narran Lakes excursion, as part of our History class

Camping Trip in week 4 - weather and insects permitting.

Congratulations to all of our students who have won *student of the week* this year!

Most of our students have also earned prizes via our own MC merit awards – including some footy-wear courtesy of the NRL who kindly provided us with some items at the start of the year.

We continue with our outdoor projects: The gardening plot is quite bountiful - particularly with the mix of rain and sun we have had over the last few weeks. We continue with our First Aid learning, bike repairs and swimming in time for summer. Again, the rain, although sorely needed, has halted much of our work on our outdoor pebble rug. But we will endeavour to continue this long term project. And we continue to look at developing the School Bush Garden further, with the help of community members.

With regards to other classes:

MC class are showing more independence in their work and having choices recently, so this term we suggested each member runs a cooking class this term – they will decide on recipe, budget, and allocation of jobs to the rest of the class. We are looking forward to seeing the students show some leadership here... and hopefully, show off their cooking skills too !

Although we continue going into the community with 'Food for Families' many of our visits have been cancelled due to the weather but we hope to continue these as Spring proceeds.

In PDHPE our focus is on Risk Management: Looking at Road safety, drugs and what we do to we minimise risk-taking activities.



In Maths we are moving into Probability, chance and algebra, while continuing on with our numeracy skills.

In English we are looking at visual literacy this term: that is the ability to interpret, create, question, challenge and evaluate texts that communicate with **visual** images

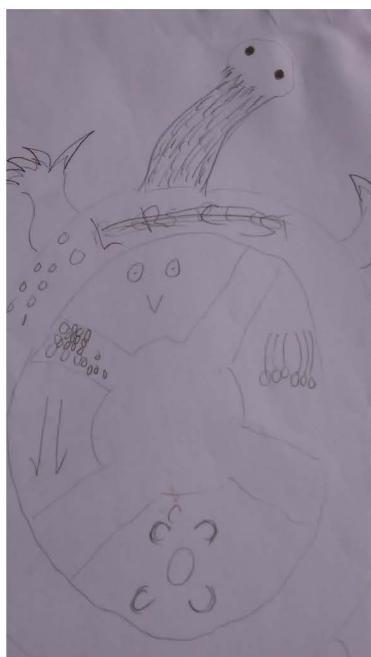
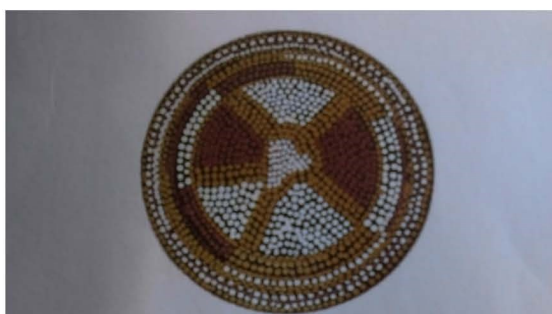
And more personal reading time. Some of the students reading skills have improved greatly and as all students are different, we asked the students to shop online for a *personal choice* book – we hope to have some quiet time reading these books as we end up a year which has seen improved literacy

We continue with History this term, persisting with our *skills* areas: definitions, terminology and the big question - *why History is important* (and what should we be learning from our learning of it?). As part of our Ancient Past learning we are planning to visit Narran Lakes. Meantime, in class, we are currently looking at 'Migration of Peoples'. This includes Migration from old to new countries.

This term Mr Reavell and Miss MacDonald continue teaching Art in the class – presently, Miss Mac's class are learning about shading and perspectives, and Mr Reavell's class are learning about different drawing styles. Both students and teachers are finding these classes relaxing.

As we would like to increase MC class excursion budget - thus reducing contributions required by parents/guardians, we have some 'business ideas': car cleaning is one we will be looking at while it remains cooler. Others include baking and sausage sizzles. The learning here, beyond the practical, will include team work, business (finance / budgeting/ marketing) and leadership skills.

Social skills – we have started looking at resilience and how to lessen anxiety during certain situations. Currently we are looking at how to deal with anger (quick/hot thoughts), and convert these to slower or 'cool thoughts'.

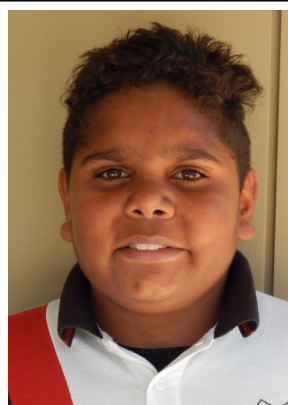

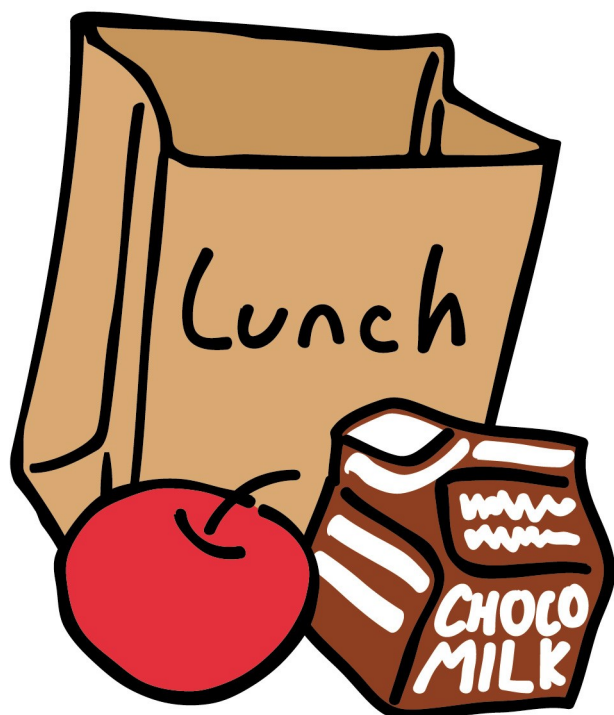
