
In addition to all of our regular things we have also managed to fit in:

As I said in a previous newsletter lateness for our secondary students was causing a problem, so over the last 3 weeks we have instituted a program of rewards. On random days, students who arrive at school before the commencement of lessons and, at the same time, requiring all students who arrive at school late without an explanation from their parents to make up that time in the school library at recess. As you can see from the graph (over page) of the average number of students late each week over the last 3 weeks we have seen a significant decline in the number of students missing valuable learning time by arriving late each week. We are also sending letters home to parents informing them of their student's lateness. This is coming as a surprise to some parents who believed that their children were leaving home and going straight to school. Do you know where your children are in the morning?

Haileybury – one of Melbourne's top private schools – was awarded Primary School of the Year they also took home the award for Australian School of the Year.

"We're renowned for our explicit instruction model. Haileybury's Deputy Principal, John Fleming, said

"The model has resulted in Haileybury Junior School becoming one of the top performing schools in terms of student achievement in Australia," Fleming told The Educator in an interview.

Big deal! So what? Why should Lightning Ridge be celebrating the success of some private school in Melbourne?

The answer is very simple. Last year our school, ahead of the game yet again, identified John Fleming and explicit instruction is the way forward for our school's academic results. Twice this year John Fleming and his team have visited lightning Ridge to work with our staff and train them on the implementation of the explicit instruction model. We have already started using this successful model to teach your children more effectively. It makes me feel great to see the fantastic success that his own school has had in Melbourne.

If you want the same academic results as top private schools do not waste your money paying their fees, come to Lightning Ridge Central School. Our continuing work with John over the next few years will see a huge increase in our academic results.

The only problem is your children have to come to school every day prepared to learn or nothing will help improve their academic results.

If you would like to discuss anything mentioned in this newsletter or any other matters please feel free to come in and have a chat. Parents and community members are always welcome however; it is wise to make an appointment beforehand to avoid having to wait.



Deputy Principal's Report

Late is not Great!

We are continuing our focus on school attendance, specifically arriving on time to school. Those student who do arrive on time at 8:40 have been receiving rewards, this includes hot chocolate, sausage sandwich and even bacon & egg sandwich, they never know what they will receive or what day it will happen.

Those students who arrive late are placed on detention, phone calls are made to parents/carers and letters have been sent home to keep families informed of their child's lateness to school. Arriving on time to work is an essential part of working life and our young adults need to learn this necessary trait. I often ask our students what would happen if they arrived 20 minutes late to work everyday, they generally reply that they would lose their job. We are simply trying to ensure that when your child leaves school and gets a job they wont be fired for being late as it has become a habit.

R U OK? Day last Friday saw the school covered in yellow. Staff & students wore yellow, we tied yellow ribbons & balloons to the front fence and secondary students listened to a presentation from our relieving District Guidance office Kayla providing a very important message about helping each other through the tough times that we might all experience. On Friday 14th September some of our students are going to attend the community R U OK? event.

The Tell Them From Me Survey is open until the 26th of October 2018, the information gathered from the survey will provide us with important information which will be used to develop our next school plan. The survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 27th August and 26 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

All candidates spoke very well, clearly stating why they are the right person for the job. The 2019 School captains will be announced shortly.


Yuwaalaraay Word of the Week

Yuwaalaraay is the dialect of the Lightning Ridge area. The name of the language and Aboriginal people of the Balonne River Region.






Library News

Well after Book Week everything seems a little less exciting. I didn't really want to take down the displays and I suppose I will just have to be content with the displays of students work and our new books. The kids love Book Week and all of the other library events and even students who have been here years ago ask me about different library things. Logan Taylor, who is working so well in our school as an aide asked me about Books in Homes recently and he said it was the best thing he remembers and that he still has his Books in Homes books. It is great to have good memories and to share them with others.

I went to a Teacher-Librarian Conference for K-6 Talking About Texts. It reinforced that what I am doing here is good and I felt like a Treasure Hunter after Book Week at this Conference. I was immersed in Rich Texts and was with those who have a passion for books. Authors and illustrators make conscious decisions when they write and illustrate and it is our job to interpret them. Analysing what you read is a syllabus outcome, but it is also developing understanding when you have skills that relate to texts. Good writers start off as good readers. Paul MacDonald from the Children's Bookshop in Beecroft spoke and repeated something I firmly believe in: the best way to improve NAPLAN results is to read for pleasure. Children need to be read to, spoken with and they also need to have a connection with adults who read. Homes need to be places that value reading. (Pity we don't still get Books in Homes as I know some families cannot afford to buy books...that's why I am forever suggesting visits to the Town Library as a family activity. Have you done this lately?)

Stage 3 have, in groups, been rewriting blurbs from the Younger Readers category of books from the CBCA shortlist. I have been very impressed with their group discussion, their use of a thesaurus and also their ability to help each other edit their work. Stage 2 worked with the text *A Walk in the Bush* also part of the Shortlist and then walked around our school observing as the characters in the story had done the birds, animals and plants in our school environment. It was lovely to sit quietly and see especially the parrots who visit our school. The students were asked to repeat this observation in their home environment. Stage 1 and Kindergarten have enjoyed the book *Rodney Loses It!* This is a great read aloud book and I did so enjoy acting and using my voice to read and entertain. Students joined in and we had a lot of fun. It is a book that I would recommend to own with great opportunities to read with expression. It also won in its CBCA Category for Early childhood. I listened online to someone reading this text and I must say they didn't read it as well as me. Perhaps they didn't love the book as much as me! If you love a book it comes across to kids. Choose a favourite of yours and try reading it to your kids and see if this happens for you too.



This is a book I think is suitable for K-6 and therefore I will be exposing all students to this text. Please ask your kids about it and if you are thinking of a Christmas book purchase this is a good one. Perhaps we will have an oral reading competition with this book as I have heard students repeat parts of the book and I have loved hearing their expressive voices.

The LRCS Reading Challenge finishes this week: Week 8, Thursday, 13th September. With all that has gone on this term I can understand that some students haven't handed in their sheets

yet, but there is still a week to go as I type this (6th!) The party for those who hand in their recording sheets is on Monday 17th September in the library at lunchtime. This is a free event to celebrate the achievement of reading ten or more books during the term. It is achievable for all students I believe.



Every year more than 160 million drink containers end up as litter in NSW, hurting our environment and costing our community millions to clean up.

That's why the Return and Earn container deposit scheme is rolling out statewide from 1 December 2017. You'll be able to do your bit for the environment by returning eligible containers for a 10c refund at hundreds of collection points across NSW.



ELIGIBLE DRINK CONTAINERS

Most 150-millilitre to 3-litre drink containers are refundable if they are made from:

- Glass
- PlasticAluminium
- Steel
- Liquid paperboard (cartons)

Wine, spirits, cordial and plain milk containers are generally NOT eligible. Containers should be empty, uncrushed, unbroken and have the original label attached. If a container is not

All collection points accept all eligible containers. For convenience, we recommend you visit the following based on the number of containers you are returning.

Over the counter returns

Over the counter manual collection points are best suited to redeeming smaller numbers of containers. Some have a limit of 100 containers at one time; please call 1800 290 691 to check for any limits on your local collection point. When you use a collection point hosted by one of our Return and Earn over the counter partners you can choose to get a cash refund, spend your money at the shop, or donate your money if the host is a charity.

Collected more than 100 drink containers?

We recommend using your local reverse vending machine (RVM)* for up to 500 containers at one time. Through the RVM you can choose to get a digital refund to your PayPal account, a cash or retail refund through a collection partner site, or make a donation to a nominated Return and Earn charity. Visit an automated deport to return larg volumes of containers. These sites have automat counters to process your containers faster.





Tell Them From Me student survey: Information and consent form for parents and carers

Dear Parents and Carers

This term, our school is taking part in the *Tell Them From Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help them improve. The survey is completed on-line and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Staff in schools will <u>not</u> be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

This survey will help our school better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will help the school identify what works to improve student outcomes.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

If you <u>do not want</u> your child to take part in the survey, please complete the attached form and return it to your child's school by 31st August 2018
