These ladies toiled, ably supported by Hallie and Ruby Bamford and Ella Nagy for many hours on the weekend to create a masterpiece which I felt guilty eating... it looked so good! Despite its artistic merits, the cake was devoured by all and sundry. 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# COVID News

This week, and in response to the burgeoning spread of COVID in greater Sydney, regional schools went to Level 2 restrictions.

At this point in time the following advice applies for Lightning Ridge Central School students and staff, based on NSW Department of Education and NSW Health advice:

## ***Masks and Face Coverings***

While at school, masks or face coverings are recommended in all indoor settings for:

- all students in Year 7 and above.
- all staff in school settings.

NSW Health has mandated the wearing of masks on public transport. **Please be aware that public transport extends to school buses.**

In a nutshell, masks are recommended in school settings but **MUST be worn on public transport**. The modality that separates these things is important.

## ***Visitors***

Non-essential visitors are not permitted in schools. Some visitors are permitted in schools based on the guidelines that follow.

- Parents or carers who must visit the school to pick up a student, or make a payment when this cannot be actioned on-line, are required to wear a mask and complete the QR codes on entry.
- All non-essential meetings with parents and carers will be conducted by phone to minimise the number of visitors entering the school. Please ensure you maintain social distancing at drop off and pick up times.

From Monday the 19th of July, visitors to the school may be challenged when attending the office as to whether they have come from the greater Sydney region. If they have come from the Fairfield Local Government Area (LGA), they will be required to show evidence of a negative COVID test taken within the preceding **72 hours** so as to remain on school site. If they come from a greater Sydney LGA other than Fairfield, they will be required to show evidence of a negative COVID test taken within the preceding **7 days**.

## ***What is permitted during school hours and within schools under these restrictions?***

- School sport can continue within school grounds.
- Work experience can continue.
- Scripture lessons for those who have elected to attend can continue.

## ***Events and off-site Activities:***

- All indoor excursions off-site are cancelled.
- The **Stage 5 excursion to Sydney** scheduled for week 7 this term has been postponed until term 4.
- The **Stage 3 excursion to Canberra** is in jeopardy. A final decision on whether it goes ahead or is postponed will be made on 30<sup>th</sup> July and publicised to the school community.
- **VET work placement and TAFE** will be able to continue under COVID safety guidelines.
- Assemblies are able to continue but visitors will not be allowed to participate; no guest presenters.

## ***Information for parents and guardians:***

Students are not to attend school with any COVID / Flu like symptoms. Students who present at school with these symptoms will be sent home and may not return to school until they have a negative COVID test result and are symptom free.

The directions received at school from Education and Health change with little notice. The situation needs to be viewed as highly fluid as does our response, but please be aware we will do what we can to keep you in the loop in a timely manner.

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## Secondary Deputy Principal's Report

Welcome back to Term 3! We are all so very fortunate to be living in Lightning Ridge and not in one of the COVID hot spots which are locked down. We have discussed with the students the need to keep their social distance, use hand sanitiser and if they wish to, wear a face mask. The Department has stated that the use of face masks is recommended however, not mandatory. Students were informed that if they have symptoms they must get tested, stay at home until a negative result is provided and return to school when they are symptom free. Parent Teacher interviews which were scheduled for week 2, have been unfortunately cancelled as we all need to comply with

COVID restrictions.

Due to the current COVID situation some of our excursions have either been cancelled or postponed to later in the year. Fortunately we are able to have local excursions, Mrs Currey will continue to provide opportunities for students to visit some of the local farms to continue to develop their agricultural skills.

Students in Years 12 have only a few weeks left before they will sit their Trial examinations, with final class assessments now being completed, then students MUST focus on their examinations which will be held in Week 6. This examination is very important for the students as it will impact on their HSC and it gives students an indication as to their anticipated HSC result. Please discuss with your child their study timetable. At this time of the year students tend to lose motivation, and yet they are so close to completing their secondary education.

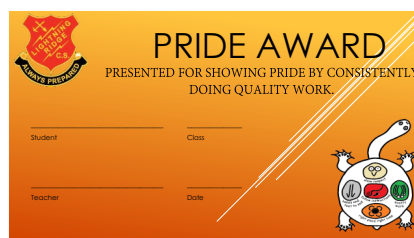

A jam packed term, all activities will happen in-line with COVID guidelines meaning the production and author visits may happen via video conferencing.

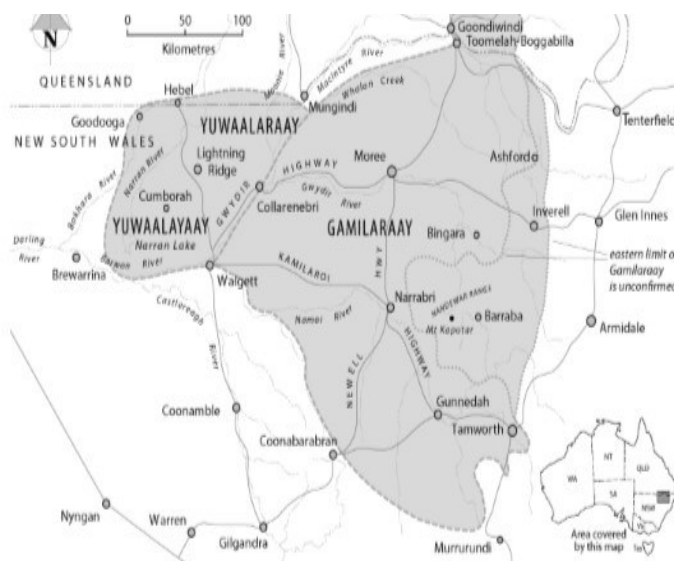

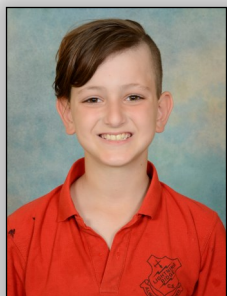

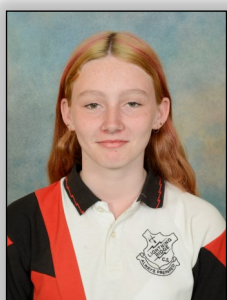

This Term Kindergarten have been learning family names in Yuwaalaraay.

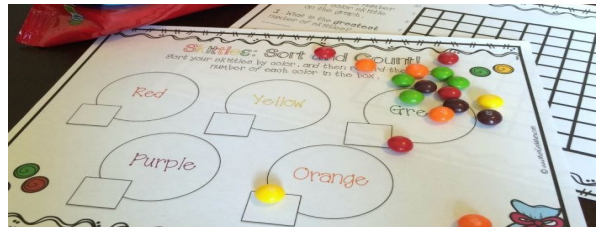

Uncle Simon brought a spear in for the students to look at and hold.

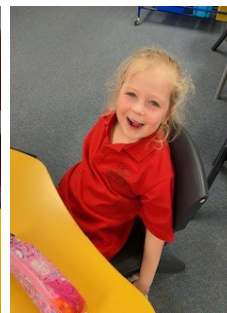


In Mathematics, ES1J have been learning about data and what better way to do that than with a packet of skittles.

Some of these drinks have more then 108 grams of sugar (22 teaspoons) and 240 mg of Caffeine (3 standard coffees)

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# Design and Technology

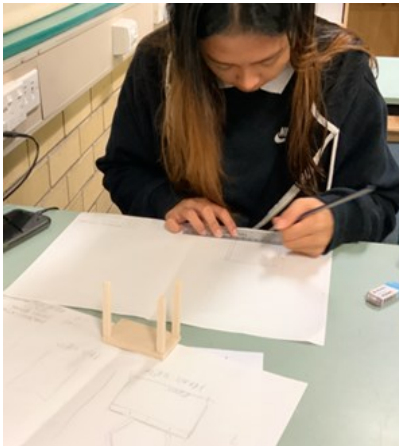
Yr 12 Students have been busy completing their Major Design Projects as the due date for the Major work is the 19<sup>th</sup> of August.

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# Design and Technology

## Year 7

During semester one, the year seven group learned to use tools safely. They were able to complete some excellent tote trays and jewellery boxes. These were decorated, using the woodburning tools and the students couldn't wait to get them home.



## Year 8

Students continue to extend their knowledge of wood and they begin to use metal working machinery and techniques.

They experimented with bending and shaping metal to make prototypes for a metal mouse trap. During term two they rediscovered woodwork and they completed some joinery, to create a lidded storage box.

The students worked very well in class. Their class assessment project was to plan and construct a table from recycled materials. The boys set about deconstructing a series of wooden pallets. The timber salvaged from this was cleaned up and used to construct bedside, outdoor and coffee tables.



## MC

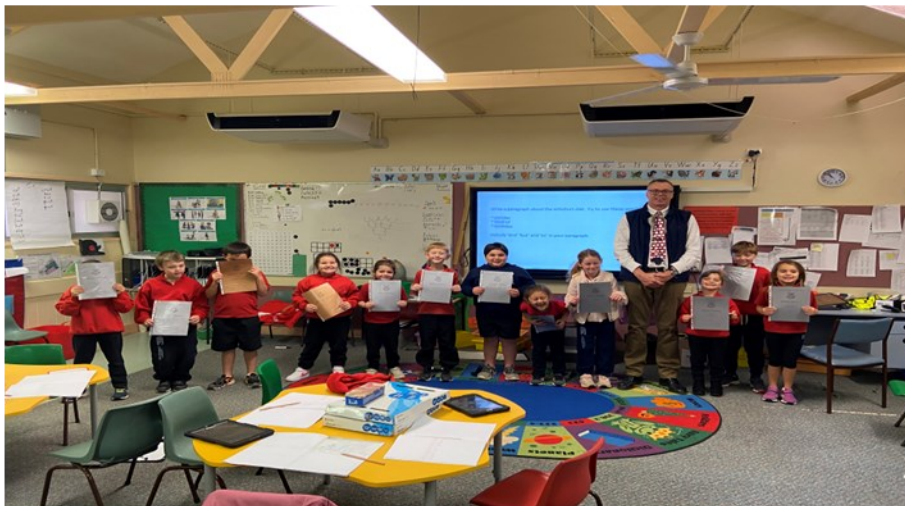
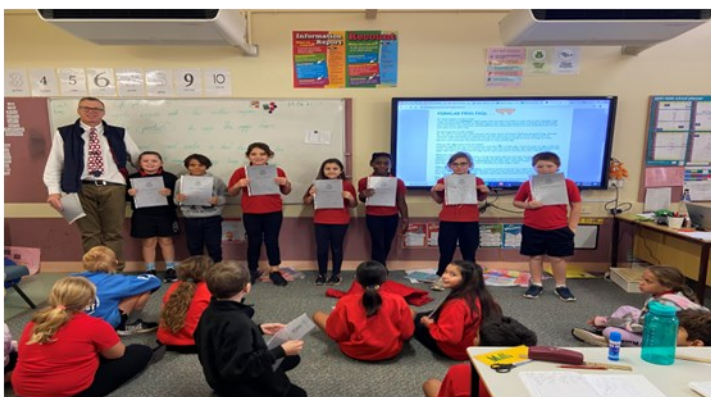
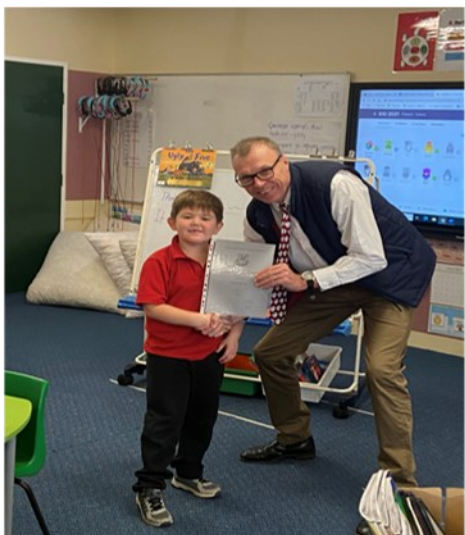
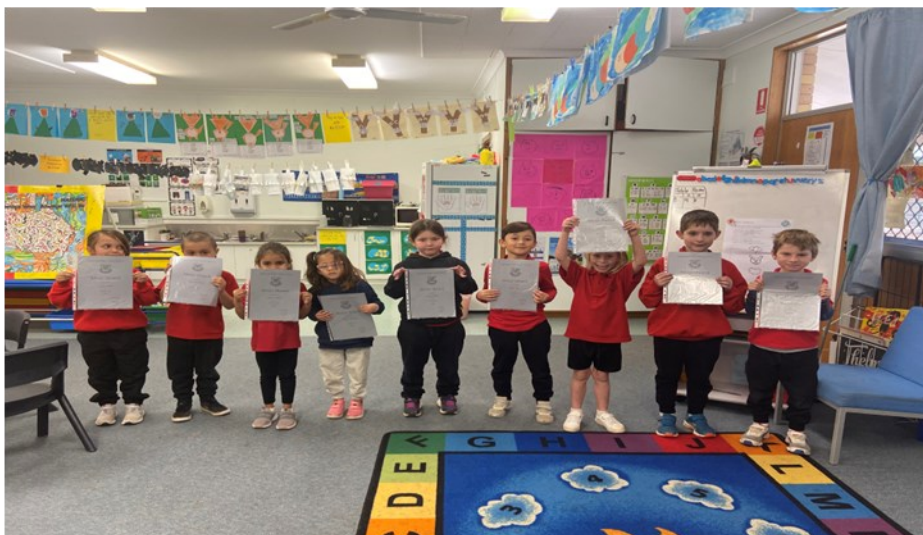
The MC class have enjoyed learning about tools and machines in the woodwork room. They also learned how to stay safe in the room when working around others.

## ALERT: ASTHMA AND AEROSOLS

Some members of the Lightning Ridge Central School Community suffer severe allergies to aerosol sprays or perfumes that can act as a trigger to an (often) serious asthma attack, or bring on a medical complication in a sensitive individual.

The allergy can be sufficiently serious to put staff or students into anaphylactic shock if an aerosol can has been used anywhere in their vicinity. This can be a life threatening situation, resulting in the staff member or student being transported to hospital in an ambulance.

- Roll-on and stick deodorants are permitted at school.
- Aerosols are banned from school premises, excursions, sporting events and all events where students are in confined spaces.
- Students are encouraged to follow correct hygiene procedures by applying deodorant at home after showering: a good deodorant will last all day if applied to clean skin before dressing.

**Let's Help to Create an Asthma Friendly school. This means that everyone needs to be aware of their own:**

- Right to a safe learning environment.
- Responsibility for the health and safety of others in their shared spaces.

**Remember: No student is to use or bring aerosol deodorants or sprays to school.** Teachers have been asked to confiscate any aerosol products found at school and bring them to the Deputy Principal. Parents will be informed that the products have been collected from their son or daughter and that they can call into the school and collect the product.
