Principal's Report

Attendance

International Research demonstrates a strong correlation between students' learning, long- term life outcomes, attendance at school and appropriate participation in

education programs. For this reason, the NSW Department of Education has very clear policies and guidelines in relation to student attendance at school.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling. Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Regular school attendance enables students to maximise their full potential and to actively participate and engage in their learning. It is important that children develop habits or regular attendance at an early age. Students who are regularly absent from school are at risk of missing out on fundamental aspects of their educational and social development. Children with attendance of 80 per cent or less (that is, 40 days or more absenteeism per year) may be significantly disadvantaged in their learning.

Consistent and sustained high attendance rates at school are no different to the attendance rates required to succeed in the work place.

Late is not Great

Arriving at school and class on time is also crucial to success to educational success:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day.
- · Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine.
- · Give students time to greet their friends before class.
- · Reduces classroom disruption.

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

At the beginning of the day students are informed of the day's program, events and important instructions are often given. Students arriving late to school (after 9:00 am in Primary and 8:40am in Secondary) also disrupt the class they are in, as they get organised and settled for the day.

Kindergarten have been learning to build and code mini Botzees by following a line and command cards.








Music Awards

Geography

Year 7

Students have been learning about water in the world. Students have been investigating the different components of the water cycle and how it connects people and places. Students have also been exploring Australia's major water sources; both rivers and lakes. Additionally, we are starting our Assessment Tasks on Lake Eyre.

Year 9

Students have been learning about environmental change and management. Students have been developing an understanding of the functioning of environments and the scale of human-induced environmental change challenging sustainability. English

Year 7

Year 8

Students have embarked on an exciting journey into the rich world of Australian poetry. We have been exploring the captivating verses of renowned Australian poets, uncovering the hidden gems that lie within our country's literary heritage. From the vivid landscapes of Dorothea Mackellar's "My Country" to the profound themes of identity and belonging in Oodgeroo Noonuccal's "We Are Going", our young scholars are gaining fresh perspectives on Australia's cultural tapestry.

Year 10

English have been looking at Poetry Through the Ages, we started way back with the Ancient Greeks and their favourite poem type, "The Ode". We've looked at popular poems from Medieval Europe and "Shakespear's Sonnet 18", and learnt how to sing some songs written in middle English.


Secondary History

Year 10 History

In Year 10 History, students are studying Rights & Freedoms. We are currently looking at activists and their aim of achieving change for the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders. One of our case studies focused on AM Fernando, who travelled all the way to England in the early 1900s dressed with skeletons on his cloak to spread the word about what was happening to his people back in Australia. He kept detailed notebooks on his travels and students have studied these as a primary source to inform their understanding of Fernando's goals as an activist. Students have been having some fantastic class discussions about our rights and the history of Governments that haven't respected the rights of all people.


