# **Principal's Report**

In the last two weeks we have had a significant number of infants and primary students who have come to school exhausted and the result of this has been the need for them to sleep in the Check In - Check Out Room. Hence, they have lost valuable learning time.

Likewise, we have had increased numbers of secondary students coming late to school and when questioned it was because they could not get out of bed and in many cases they had gone to bed way too late. For them also, the result is a loss of learning time.

I suspect much of the delay in sleep is because students are on game consoles or phones, so can I please ask that parents and carers closely monitor access to this technology. Turn the internet modem off if necessary.

Traditionally, these situations worsen when daylight saving comes into play and this will happen over the holidays so I ask could parents and carers please use the holiday time to get their children into a sound routine of bed time and get up time.

Your child's learning will benefit greatly.

Just as a reminder I have published some information from the South Australian Health Website on the benefits of sleep below.

#### Good sleep = good health

Sleeping well makes us feel better, more alert, energetic, and better able to concentrate and perform our daily tasks. Getting enough sleep each day is one of the most important things you can do for your health and wellbeing and to reduce your risk for ill-health.

#### Why sleep is important?

It is well known that sleep is an important biological function essential for life. While we sleep many important functions take place that help the body in physical recovery and repair, support brain development, cardiac function and body metabolism, as well as support learning, improving memory and mood. Sleep is especially important for children playing an important role in growth and overall health, and babies and children need much more sleep than adults.

Without enough sleep we are more likely to have problems with thinking, concentration, memory, reaction times and mood, all of which make it harder to perform our daily tasks and increase the risks of mistakes and accidents. Regular insufficient or poor sleep contributes to long-term health problems such as;

During the last 2 weeks our students have participated in:

## **Primary Assistant Principal's Report**


### Library






I would also like to congratulate the other students who made speeches and stood for election: Skye Noyes, Parker Bevan, Tom Pickering.




### **Music Awards**



# Bushfire danger period information for parents and carers



### **Factsheet**

This factsheet provides information for parents and carers about arrangements for the bushfire danger period.

The NSW Department of Education has engaged external experts to conduct assessments of all NSW government schools, to identify schools at greater risk of impact from bushfires.

To support the health, safety and wellbeing of students and staff, the department, in consultation with NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS), will direct the school to temporarily cease operations on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating has been declared for your school's NSW fire area. Alternative learning arrangements will be put in place for these days.

Schools may be directed by the department to become non-operational at any time based on advice from emergency services and the State Emergency Operations Centre.



Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a fire start. The ratings are determined by a combination of factors including air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought.

# When will I know if my child's school has been made non-operational?

At approximately 4:00pm each day the Fire Danger Rating is issued for the following day. This means that schools, including onsite preschools, will be notified after school hours that it will be non-operational the following day. Your school will notify you as soon as possible by the preferred method of communication.

#### Parents and carers are requested to:

- provide up-to-date home and after-hours contact details to your school
- stay up-to-date with news and local media through the bushfire danger period.

What education arrangements will be in place if the school is non-operational?


